



PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING

What is Pupil Premium Funding?

In 2011 – 2012 the Government changed the formula for school funding and introduced Pupil Premium. School received this grant into the school budget based on the number of pupils in the school who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) on a particular day each year.

From 2012 it has been expanded to include all children who are registered in school on that particular day who are either FSM or have been at any time in the previous 6 years.

Nationally, statistics show that pupils who are in receipt of FSM do less well than their peers and this funding is to enable schools to try and close the attainment gap.

In addition the school receives Pupil Premium Funding for pupils who have been “in care” for more than 6 months. These children are described as Looked after children (CLA)

Pupil Premium 2011 – 2012 The school received £4 880

The finding was used for:

- Additional Teaching Assistant hours to work with small groups and for 1:1 support
- ICT equipment
- After school clubs

Comparative data was not kept at this time.

Pupil Premium 2012 – 2013 The school received £8 080

The finding was used for:

- Additional teaching hours to reduce class sizes £5 355
- Additional teaching hours for 1:1 £2 240
- Reading books £ 135
- After School Clubs £ 200
- Musical Instrument Tuition £ 150

End of KS2 data for 2013 demonstrates that:

Pupil Premium Children made good progress with a value added score of 102.0 overall. All children in school had a value added score of 100.9 overall.

Children making expected progress have a value added score of 100.0, so all children made better than expected progress.

Average point scores for Pupil Premium Children demonstrated an improvement from 2011 – 2013:

Mathematics	raised by 4.0 points
Reading	raised by 2.0 points
Writing	raised by 2.0 points
Overall Scores	raised by 3.0 points

Pupil Premium 2013 – 2014 The school received £ 20 700

The funding was used for:

- Additional teaching hours to reduce class sizes £3 000
- Consultant teachers to diagnose specific learning issues £1 120
- 1:1 Tuition £6 680
- Purchase of iPads £1 506
- Additional 1:1 for KS2 children for SATs preparation £2 520

As £9 900 of the funding did not appear in the budget until late in the year, some funding was carried forward until 2014 – 2015.

Closing the Gaps data for 2013 – 2014 demonstrates that the gap between disadvantaged pupils and all pupils is decreasing for all subjects, writing and mathematics but has risen in reading.

Value added data for the school was lower this year at 99.5 and for disadvantaged pupils this was 98.8.

50% of disadvantaged children were not in school for all of years five and six. 75% of disadvantaged children were not at this school for their KS1 SATs.

25% of disadvantaged pupils had been in school for one month prior to KS1 SATs.

The average point score gains for Pupil Premium Children across the school were:

Reading	4.076 points
Writing	4.692 points
Maths	3.846 points

Pupil Premium Funding 2014 – 2015

The school budget was £34 139*

**This includes a carry forward from last year*

Plans were made to use the funding for:

- 1:1 individual tuition £ 7 987
- Teaching Assistant contribution for intervention groups £10 000
- Contribution towards the cost of a class teacher £ 5 000
- Pupil Premium Champion £ 5 320
- SEND Buy – Back 2.5 hours every two weeks £ 2 750
- Consultant teachers to diagnose specific learning issues £ 1 600
- Contingency for materials/training to support SEND £ 1 689

School Data demonstrates that:

The average point score gains for Pupil Premium Children across the school were:

Reading	4.095 points
Writing	3.236 points
Maths	3.560 points

Closing the Gaps data for 2014 – 2015 is not yet available from Raiseonline.

50% of Year 6 in 2014 – 2015 were Pupil Premium children, and 25% were in school for just years five and six. 50% of disadvantaged children were not at this school for their KS1 SATs.

Pupil Premium Funding 2015 – 2016 The school allocation was confirmed as £27 720 + carry forward = £43.418

Plans have been made to use the funding for:

• 1:1 individual tuition	£ 7 987
• Teaching Assistant contribution for intervention groups	£ 15 000
• Contribution towards the cost of a class teacher	£ 5 000
• SEND Buy – Back 2.5 hours every two weeks	£ 2 750
• Consultant teachers to diagnose specific learning issues	£ 1 600
• Contingency for materials/training to support SEND	£ 1 689
• Cool Milk	£ 950
• Release of Class Teachers for Intensive Support	£ 2 400
• Behavioural Support Packages	£ 1 000
• Education City/IT packages	£ 1 500
• First News Children’s Newspaper	£ 143
• Education Welfare Services for support with Absence	£ 1 000
• Music Tuition for CLA	£ 320
• Contingency	£ 2 979

There are currently 14 children who benefit from Pupil Premium. There are no children in Year 2 or Year 6 for 2015 - 2016
